Study Day

To offer maximum flexibility to the workplace, knowledge is delivered via a regional study day. The knowledge delivered on the study day covers both Module 1 – Drug History Taking and Module 2 – Medicines Reconciliation.

The study day covers the following learning objectives:

- Define and describe the rationale for Medicines Reconciliation
- Distinguish the difference between Medicines Reconciliation and Drug History Taking
- Identify and use reliable sources of information to conduct Drug History Taking
- Demonstrate the ability to retrieve information from a variety of sources to complete the Drug History taking process
- Apply appropriate communication skills to retrieve information from patients, carers and relatives and other Healthcare Professionals
- Demonstrate the ability to document information relating to the Drug History in line with your own Trust's guidelines and policies
- Describe the process for verifying the Drug History information and identify discrepancies
- Determine and demonstrate the most appropriate way to action and communicate discrepancies
- Know and apply to practice the legislation that applies to writing in patient's medical notes
- Identify situations when it is appropriate to write in patient's notes
- Demonstrate what should be written and how
- Describe how to correct mistakes when writing in the roles
- Be aware of "what not to write"
- Provide evidence of knowledge of the Medicines Reconciliation process
